

WINTER TERM STATS

Winter term enrollment exceeded fall term in student count by 16 students. The final enrollment for Winter was 162 students taking 178 courses; in fall term, 146 students took 174 classes. Winter term count does not include the 18 students who attended the movie series as that was a free benefit for members. These are strong numbers particularly as the Society did not offer evening classes in a season record snowfall.

There were 50 students returning and 112 new students taking classes at the Society. Once again, history remains our strongest draw with the *Lincoln Legend lecture* (Gene Dreyfus) and 20th Century *Erie Politics* (Dr. Garvey) with classes over 20 students. American Religion in the 21st Century (Very Rev. Downey) and *Performance Techniques* (Shawn Clerkin) finished strong at 18 or more students.

Seminars were more popular during the winter while courses were the bigger draw in the fall. Lectures do better when they are stand alone rather than as part of a series.

Springhill Initiative

As part of our efforts to broaden the reach of the Society and its educational programming, the Jefferson held a special seminar off site on the grounds of Springhill. Dr. Garvey offered a three part seminar, *War in the Pacific*, which drew 19 students. This is beginning of a positive partnership and the Society will continue to explore similar relationships with organizations in Erie.

SPRING SESSION: MARCH 23-MAY 1

Spring session was moved back a week and will begin on March 23. The Society will be open for registration weekdays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; special weekend registration on March 21-22, 2-4 p.m.

Spring schedule brings an interesting line-up that includes 11 new instructors. Among those joining the Society faculty list are: Dr. David Kozak, Ph.D.; Chet Giermak; Dr. Tom Forsthoefel, Ph.D.; Kathy Pirrello; Captain Walter Rybka; and Susan Kemenyffy.

Class topics range from the Molly McGuires, the Pennsylvania Irish coal miners secret society, the Dalai Lama, Political Change since 1968, King Lear, Poetry, Ancient Persia, Immigrant Novels, the War of 1812, and the Holocaust. Most exciting are two NEW initiatives on the schedule for the Spring session: The One Day University and Great Decisions.

One Day University Offered

One Day University at the Jefferson will explore provocative questions with community leaders and professional educators who provide participants with interesting insights into the issues and the personalities who shape them. The topic for our inaugural one day program is *The Role of Philosophy in the Human Experience* and includes one-hour lectures from Susan Kemenyffy, Dr. David Kozak, Chet Giermak and Dr. Garvey. One Day University is set for April 25 from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.; cost is \$100 per person and member benefit hours do not apply to this program.

Great Decisions Program

Great Decisions is a global affairs education program of the Foreign Policy Association, of which the Jefferson Society is a member. Seminars will engage participants in learning about the world through the discussion and analyses of issues of that are of concern to US policy makers today and that represent foreign policy challenges of tomorrow. Speakers this term are professors and scholars who have been exiled or have escaped oppression in their home countries. The Scholars at Risk program is presented in conjunction with New York University. The Society will offer two Great Decisions seminars: *Human Rights Watch* with Anna Dolidze, LLM and Irakli Kakabadze, MS, and *Pakistan, Kashmir and Afghanistan* with Arif Jamal, MSC.

Also, the Society is carrying the information for the Jewish Community Council's lecture and movie premier of *Blessed is the Match* on our schedule. The event will be held at the Temple Anshe Hesed at 10th and Liberty Streets and is free and open to the public.



GRANTS REQUESTED

To date, the Society has delivered 5 grant requests totaling \$500,000 with local, state, and federal agencies. Grant requests range from assistance with working capital, operating costs, educational programming and specific civic publications. The grant requests include the following:

Federal Appropriation Proposal

The Jefferson Society has submitted a federal appropriation funding request through the office of Senator Robert Casey, Jr. The Jefferson Society requested the federal earmark for the initial planning with community partners for the organizing of Erie's critical role in the Battle of Lake Erie during the War of 1812 as part of the national Bicentennial commemoration.

County of Erie Proposal

A proposal for the support of civic programming at the Jefferson has been submitted to County government for consideration of regional assets funding. The proposal had its first reading at County Council and is expected to have the second reading at the March 24 meeting scheduled for 7 p.m.

NewPA Proposal

The Jefferson Society is working with Senator Jane Earll on a proposal for organizational assistance through the NewPA Single Application process. The request will seek funding support for operating costs, working capital, educational and civic programming, Civic issue publications, and other indirect costs.

DCED Community Revitalization Proposal

The Jefferson Society has met with state representative Flo Fabrizio and Pat Harkins on a proposal for support of the *Jefferson Civic Journal*, civic and educational programming, and other indirect costs. The funding request is directed at the Community Development and Revitalization program.

Erie Community Foundation Proposal

The Jefferson Society will be submitting a \$50,000 proposal through the Foundation's *Helping Today* program for support of our proposed Erie Civic journal and Community Issue newsletters. The Human Services and Community Development grants requests are due May 4.

Teaching American History

The Society is supporting the Intermediate Unit in its request for a federal grant for Teaching American History, with a focus on Pennsylvania and Erie history.

INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH GRANT

City of Erie School Board

At its February 11 meeting, the City of Erie School Board unanimously approved an Institutional Research Proposal for the Jefferson Society to produce a "History of the Erie School District from 1970 through 2008."

The final responsibility for the publishing of the manuscript, the actual distribution and utilization would be the responsibility of the School District unless such authority for these functions are delegated to the Jefferson Society. The Jefferson Society has contracted with Dr. Robert Guerrein, Ph.D., to write the History and the research will begin in March.

SPRING I COURSE DESCRIPTIONS AT THE JEFFERSON EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY

Wisdom and Compassion in the Teaching of the Dalai Lama (Lecture, 1.5 hours). Lecture will focus on the inspirations and motivations found in the teaching of the Dali Lama, the spiritual and temporal leader of Tibet. The Dali Lama won the Nobel Prize for Peace 1989. Book signing follows lecture. Dr. Tom Forsthoefel, Ph.D., instructor.

American Political Change: 1968 to Present (Seminar, 4 hours). An examination of the tumultuous events of 1968 and how they unleashed a series of shock waves and changes that had ramifications for an entire generation. Seminar concludes with a comparison of older, pre-1968 politics and the politics of today, emphasizing those factors that account for the new contemporary Obama-era politics. *Dr. David Kozak, Ph.D., instructor*

The Molly McGuires: The Truth Behind the Myth (Lecture, 1.5 hours). An exploration of the myth of the Molly McGuires, the Pennsylvania Irish Coal miner secret society. Lecture will examine how media and ethnic bias allowed demagogues to usurp the judicial powers of the state and hang 20 men. Book signing follows lecture. *Atty. William Burke, JD, instructor.*

Two Significant People in the Life of Abraham Lincoln: Stephen Douglas and Mary Todd (Seminar, 4 hours). An exploration of the split life of Mary Todd Lincoln and the two men she loved most. Seminar will examine the nuances in the greatest argument of its age—the 1858 Senate debates between Stephen Douglas and Abraham Lincoln. *Gene Dreyfus, M.B.A., instructor*

The War of 1812 in the Great Lakes (Seminar, 4 hours). An overview of the causes and events leading up to the Lake Erie battle, including, key personalities, the Perry-Elliott controversy and difficulties faced by both sides. Seminar will provide a ship master's perspective on the Battle, its aftermath and the strategic consequences. *Walter Rybka, Senior Captain, US Brig Niagara*

The Influence of Ancient Persian Empire in the Modern Middle East (Seminar, 4 hours). An examination of the ancient East/West clash of civilizations. Seminar will focus on the ancient Persian Empire that battled the Romans so successfully and whose outline is still present today. Dr. William P. *Garvey, Ph.D., instructor*

Man & King: A Look at Richard III and Lear. (Course, 8 hours). From Richard III's melodramatic, boisterous kingship to the soul-searing analysis of Lear-- the man and the king, Shakespeare presents us with two brilliant examples of his understanding of human motivation and the tragic consequences that stem from our decisions. The Holocaust: How was it Humanly Possible? (Course, 8 hours). Course will examine the Holocaust through the study of the rise of the Nazi Party, the role and life of the ghettos, the final solution and the extermination camps, the resistance movements, the War Crime Trials and genocides after the Holocaust. Course concludes with presentation from Holocaust survivor Hans Haurwitz. *Kathy Pirrello, MA candidate, Siegal College of Judaic Studies, 2010*

Seduction, Love, War, and Immortality: Poetry for People Who Hate It (Course, 8 hours) Before television and the internet, man's greatest form of entertainment was poetry. A primer on how to read a poem through the exploration of the great themes poetry offers to help us understand our world and the things that matter. *Rebecca Martin, M.A., instructor*

Blessed is the Match: The Life and Death of Hannah Senesh (Free Film & Lecture) The Jewish Community Council of Erie welcomes director and producer Roberta Grossman to the Erie screening of her film, *Blessed is the Match*. Narrated by three-time Academy Award nominee Joan Allen, the film is the first documentary feature about Hanna Senesh, the World War II-era poet who became a resistance fighter . 
